From the President



My first published work was a three-line report in the school newspaper when I was six. I wrote for later school newspapers and yearbooks, won prizes for essays and interviews, but no one ever suggested I could choose to be a writer after I left school. No one, that is, until my late husband's cousin suggested I take a romance writing class at UCLA as an escape from grief.

In 2010, I saw a newspaper announcement of a Chesapeake Bay Writers program and emerged from the self-imposed isolation that started with my 2004 move to Mathews. I dared to go and soon joined the club. By 2012, I was an at-large board member assisting with program arrangements and started writing a column in *Chesapeake Style* magazine. I had a short story published in the 2013 CBW Anthology *Harboring Secrets*.

In 2014, I was elected CBW President and published my nonfiction book, *Drowning a County*. My term as president continued through 2018, and I came back to be president again in 2020.

CBW gave me the encouragement, information and advice that led to my first novel *Chestnut Springs*, published in 2017, and its sequel *Breaking the Eighth*, coming out this year. CBW doesn't make us writers—it helps encourage us as writers to follow our muse with advice, knowledge, and social opportunities through programs and critique groups. Not everyone will be published, but everyone can have the satisfaction of expressing themselves in writing with a little encouragement to try.

I am delighted to announce that this year, CBW will almost double its activities with the planned addition of four meetings in non-restaurant venues in addition to our five luncheon meetings with programs. Two events are already on the calendar for Saturdays, and a summer Zoom event will be scheduled so more members who cannot attend weekday programs can take advantage of CBW gatherings. Our February 16 meeting at Rocco's Smokehouse in Williamsburg offers more menu options and the usual cost is lower too. I do hope to see you there. The reservation form with full details is on the website.

Thank you to Ellen Dugan, Jeanne Johansen and Janet Fast who will be leaving the Board in February, and to Tracy Lanum who is stepping down as Radio Show Coordinator. They have been dedicated workers and a solid support to the board and membership. Thank you to Denise DeVries, Ann Skelton, and Sonja McGiboney who will be continuing on the board. And thank you to the members who have already renewed your membership. Your support has allowed us to be confident in making our new plans. For those who haven't renewed yet, we still need your support! The renewal form is at the top of the website Home page.

Thank you all for the privilege of being the president of such a wonderful organization. I have been blessed in knowing so many of you and sharing and learning with you as I moved from an aspiring to a published author. May each of your writing journeys be as satisfying!

Words to Ponder

Sunday

Writing

The day of the eternal sun!

Sunday is one of the three days of the weekly Julian calendar (created for the Western world) which are named after celestial deities, i.e., Sunday (the sun god), Monday (the moon god), and Saturday (the god Saturn). It became a religious holyday by a decree of the ancient pagan Roman emperor Constantine, on March 7, 321 —to close businesses and become the official day of rest in the Roman Empire, to celebrate the Roman sun god ('Sol Invictus', 'The Invincible Sun'), so devotees of Sol Invictus, and the other major sun religion of Rome (Mithraism), could all abstain from work and pray on the same day. This enabled the Christians (who celebrated the Jewish Sabbath) to assemble people into their own buildings, to pray, to donate, and to create converts. As Christianity steadily spread, since stores and shops were officially closed, the Christians gradually adopted Sunday as their own day of rest, and, eventually, a holy day.

The word 'writing', in the English tradition, is from Old English 'writan', meaning 'to scratch' or 'to draw a figure'. The egocentric Western world long regarded writing as a unique part of the Western tradition, inherited from the Sumerian civilization of Sumer, in Mesopotamia, around 3400-3100 BCE, to where much ancient literature is traced, including, to many scholars, portions of the Old Testament. Writing was initially used for livestock and commodities, then for commercial transactions, and gradually for religious and social representations and depictions. However, scripts were also recently discovered in Egypt (from c. 3250 BCE), and China (from c. 1250 BCE), which had no known literary contacts with these ancient civilizations. This has also given an impetus to the anthropological idea of polygenesis, that human life originated in several places, not solely in Africa.

So, You Want to Go Social

As there is a lot of interest in how to market your book to a broader audience and more effectively reach folks online, we are launching a newsletter section to share tips and tricks on using social media, websites, video, etc... What Is A Hashtag?

This question came up in our January 6th brainstorming session. A hashtag is a word with # before it. By combining these two elements, a metadata tag is created that allows content to be pulled up by topic. Hashtags are a unique data point as they are user-generated and allow users to locate things that specifically interest them. This makes them an important tool in your marketing campaigns. Additionally, hashtags enable tech companies to easily track what topics are popular from a user perspective. If you hear of something or someone trending on a social media platform, odds are hashtags helped identify that trend.

Hashtags do work better on some platforms than others. Twitter, Pinterest, LinkedIn, and Instagram are perfect places to use a hashtag. Facebook isn't the best place for them as Facebook's hashtag search functionality is limited.

A good general practice is to choose 3-5 hashtags that are relevant to your post and add them at the end of your post copy. Some folks integrate them into their copy, but this can make a post or tweet cluttered. When selecting potential search terms, you want to choose those that your audience finds relevant. For example, if I post about a new release #readersofinstagram or #bookstagram will help me find potential new readers faster than #iamwriting or #writersofinstagram. If you want to thoroughly cover your bases, then you can include hashtags for both readers and writers. Try to keep the

number of hashtags on one post under 30. Your chosen hashtags should include commonly searched terms related to your post. Platforms will often suggest terms as you type them in. For example, Instagram will recommend potential tags that include a count or frequency range of how often that hashtag is used. Pick a few of those recommendations with larger usage counts then integrate lesser-known ones or any unique hashtag you're starting related to yourself or your writing.

Lastly, some platforms do have guidelines on what hashtags work better than others to prevent spammy content from regularly surfacing or they have banned certain hashtags that surface content that doesn't align with the network's community standards. You'll want to review those guidelines to ensure whatever hashtags you are using reach your intended audience.



Enchanting Susanna turns his head, and they marry, but David finds his new life to be a fight for his very soul as his wife's scandalous affair turns an ugly tide against him.








The Blossoming: Book III of the Gannaby Family Series


Flash Fiction Tuesday


Can Ashton win Lukas to her side to save the dragons and the village from a fight that could destroy them all?
