
CBW June 21 Dinner Meeting at Goodfellas in Gloucester "The Creative Power of Revision"

DANIEL WETTA was interviewed on the March CBW Second Monday Talk Radio Show with Neal Steele about his novel, *Corvette Nightfire*.



Gail Kenna -- New Judge for SOUL-MAKING KEATS LITERARY COMPETITION

On March 5, the Koret auditorium of the San Francisco Civic Center library was packed for the 25th Soul-Making Keats Literary Competition awards ceremony. The contest is an extended community arts outreach program of the National League of American Pen Women and has a November 30th deadline each year. It offers seven categories for adults, two for youth. Each category has its own judge/sponsor. Gail Kenna, after winning five awards in the 2016 competition, was invited to be the new judge for creative non-fiction, beginning for the 2017 contest. The judge she is replacing was in this position for nine years.

Anyone who wins first, second, third or honorable mention is invited to read during the awards ceremony held each year in San Francisco. This

year's winners came from fourteen states, with two other winners from Virginia. Gail read from "Ink Stained Wench," which won first in Humor. Her "A Woman Reader from the West," took first in intercultural essay; and the story she read for the CBW November All Stars Gala luncheon took second in short story, along with honorable mentions in novel excerpt and memoir vignette. Gail encourages members to research the Soul Making Keats Literary Competition and submit entries this year.

Dr. Carolyn Kreiter-Foronda speaking on "The Revision Process of Poetry"

Dr. Carolyn Kreiter-Foronda will share her insights about the importance of honing a poem to perfection. After sharing the revision techniques of such eminent writers as William Butler Yeats and Sylvia Plath, she will focus on her own revision practices that enhance a poem's content and design. Regardless of whether one is writing fiction, nonfiction, a newspaper column, or a poem, all writers long for the moment when their work is polished enough to draw an audience of devoted readers.

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Carolyn Kreiter-Foronda served as Poet Laureate of Virginia from 2006 -2008. She has co-edited three anthologies and published seven books of poetry, including *The Embrace: Diego Rivera and Frida Kahlo*, winner of the 2014 Art in Literature: Mary Lynn Kotz Award. She is the recipient of five grants from the Virginia Commission for the Arts and has won the Ellen Anderson Award, multiple first place awards from the Chesapeake Bay Branch of the NLAPW, a resolution of appreciation from the Virginia Board of Education for her service as poet laureate, an



Edgar Allan Poe Poetry Award, and six Pushcart Prize nominations. Her poems appear in numerous magazines, including *Nimrod, Prairie Schooner, Mid-American Review, Best of Literary Journals,* and *Poet Lore.* Her poetry, along with that of other Virginia poets laureate, is featured in two art installations at the McLean Metro Station in Northern Virginia. An abstract artist, Dr. Kreiter-Foronda's paintings and sculpture have been exhibited in galleries, educational settings, and nursing homes throughout the state of Virginia.

Recent and Upcoming Interviews


