Her main character is Madelaine Jones who is reeling from her husband's death in Afghanistan when her house explodes and a mysterious letter indicates her husband might not have been a war casualty. Her desire to learn the truth involves her in international intrigue on three continents as she and an Irish intelligence officer search for answers. Curiously Susan used the name Madelaine after her best long-time friend who was visiting at the time and answered a few questions asked by Neal as well.

Mary Montague Sikes (Monti) will be the February 12th interviewee. *An Artful Animal Alphabet* featuring her paintings of favorite animals, will be discussed. Old Pompey, the last alligator that lived in the lobby of the Jefferson Hotel is featured in the beginning of her book.






